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Major foodborne pathogens include exotoxins and enterotoxins from *Escherichia coli* O157:H7, *Salmonella* spp., *Listeria monocytogenes*, *Clostridium perfringens*, *Campylobacter jejuni*, *Vibrio*

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(commonly known as food
