The received view of Thomas Hobbes's political theory defines the individual rights described by Hobbes as being, without exception, "liberty rights," that is, rights that are merely freedoms.<sup>1</sup> Liberty rights are not correlated with any duties or obligations on the part of others nor do they provide a ground for such duties or obligations; they therefore fall outside the definition of rights that is used in modern political and moral

However, social contract theory is rightly associated with modern moral and political theory and is given its first full exposition and defense by Thomas Hobbes.
