Philosopher Hannah Arendt pondered similar questions 50 years ago during the riots and social upheaval of the late 1960s. Writing in The New York Review of Books she noted how racial injustice drives

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violence, but cautioned that “Violence does not promote causes,” it only serves to “dramatize grievances and to bring them to public attention.”
