The Buddhas of Bamyan (Dari: ?????? ?????? ?; Pashto: ? ??????? ????? ?) were two 6th-century monumental statues of Gautama Buddha carved into the side of a cliff in the Bamyan valley in the Hazarajat region of central Afghanistan, 230 kilometres (140 mi) northwest of Kabul at an elevation of 2,500 metres (8,200 ft).
